MESSAGE FROM LEADERSHIP

Dear Families

We are very proud of Student Leadership at Ingle Farm. We have our Student Leaders, Peer Mediators and Team Captains. We congratulate our Leaders and Captains on their appointments. Leaders will support all our school events and will also work alongside teachers to collect learning feedback about our School Improvement Plan priorities. We want to continually make sure our improvement goals are positively and successfully impacting on learning progress. By seeking regular feedback, we will adjust our practice so students meet learning goals.

Our School Improvement Plan has two goals.

Goal 1: Increase R-6 achievement in English

Goal 2: Increase R-6 achievement in Mathematics

Home Learning

All classes have now begun formal homework. Homework is that 'compound' word that evokes a wide range of responses and emotions! Many of us base our thoughts on homework around our own experiences at school. At Ingle Farm, staff accept there is unlikely to be any homework structure that works for all families on any given night.

Each class will have slight differences in format however the expectation is that as primary school educators we are providing an opportunity for students to work on their organisational and time management skills at home to complete tasks over a weekly or fortnightly time frame. These organisational skills are expected in high school and serve well as life skills in any chosen career!

We ask that you promote opportunities at home to support your child/ren to use time efficiently within other home commitments to complete set tasks.

We also remind you that tasks set for homework are to encourage students to practise or complete skills that have been taught at school. The teaching and learning that occurs at school can be consolidated at home through practice and revision.

If your child/ren experience difficulties, please contact teacher/s so that concerns can be resolved quickly. Teachers are experienced, qualified professionals who provide students with new learning at school in a planned, sequenced manner with expectations of each individual student's achievement potential. We appreciate feedback about how successfully your child/ren manage their homework routines.

A friendly reminder that parking before and after school is not available in the staff car park unless a site permit has been provided for extenuating circumstances or if a disability permit is displayed. We do know these times are very busy, with limited spaces, however, we ask that you show patience and respect – think of it as great role modelling for your child/ren. The Council and SAPOL have been asked to monitor car parking around our site as a response to concerns raised over the previous few weeks. This is also to track the Kiss and Drop at the front of the school. The Kiss and Drop design is to keep the flow of traffic moving and is therefore not a place to park, leaving a car unattended. We also ask that students use the zebra crossing for safety as yard duty teachers have expressed concern about families allowing children to run through banked up traffic.

As the new school year is now well underway and class relationships and routines are in place, I look forward to a settled and learning focussed partnership with you to ensure we collectively support each of our students to achieve at the very best of their ability.

During this term, students in Room 5 are focusing on retelling experiences or events that occur at school through recounting, as part of their literacy learning. This includes weekly visits to the school garden, the library, or play spaces. Each day, students are building their vocabulary and developing their oral language skills by sharing personal experiences from their weekends or playtime. The 5Ws writing framework (when, where, what, who, and why) is being used to guide oral retelling or independent writing of students. It will be very exciting to see the growth with the implementation of classroom learning tools such as the 'Effort Meter' to support persistence in learning.


